#### For ESL testing:

- <u>Have an ID with your picture and your name.</u> The photo ID can be a driver's license, passport, or government issued ID.
- Testing, placement, and registering take about one and a half hours.

#### The ESL placement test will have two parts:

## The first part will consist of:

- A short, typed writing test
- A computer-based reading test

### The second part will consist of:

- A short speaking test with a teacher
- Review of test results and course selection with the teacher
  - Family members can be with you. If you need to have the same class schedule as a family member or friend, tell us. We can arrange for you to meet with an advisor together.
  - You will access the MyHarper Student Portal on the computer and learn how to register for classes online.
  - You can pay for your classes online. Payment is due within 5 business days of registration.

## What to expect on the day of the test:

- Arrive at least ten minutes before the test to check-in. Check-in is in D138.
- The test will take place in the Language Lab. (Computers available).
- After the test, you will wait to meet with a teacher. You will discuss the results with the teacher, and they will make class recommendations for you based on your results.
- If you choose to register on the same day, we can assist you to do that. We can also assist you with making payments for your classes.
