





The Harper College Educational Foundation is a special place filled with hardworking and committed volunteers and donors who create opportunities and develop resources for students to go to college. Without their help and the support of our Board of Directors, it would not be possible.

This fiscal year (FY22/23), the Educational Foundation will celebrate 50 years since it was formed in 1973. Using traditional terminology - "We've come a long way baby." The Foundation's first donation was on January 10, 1974, for unrestricted grants. The first scholarship on file was from Franchise Management Systems in May 1974 in the amount of \$500 to support Harper students in the Food Service Management program. At the end of FY74 the Foundation's total assets were \$6,700. In comparison, today, as of March 31, 2022, our total assets are \$56,434,095. Our past leaders understood the Educational Foundation would grow to develop great opportunities for future Harper College students. I wonder if they imagined this type of growth.

I am inspired by the goals and directions set forth for the Foundation these next two years to increase the scholarship opportunities available to all students. As we all work together to create new scholarship opportunities, we are empowering students to succeed and attend college. Whether enrolling with the goal to transfer to a college or university to complete a degree or certificate, scholarships provide support for a debtfree college education.

Through scholarships, we are making a difference in Harper College students' lives and futures. The decision to pursue a college education should not be based on affordability, but instead on the quality of the educational experience, ability to maximize career opportunities, long-term professional goals and a viable future. Scholarships remove barriers to make this possible.

Over the past 50 years of the Educational Foundation's history the mission and vision has been consistent, supporting Harper College students. With the help of donors, volunteers and the foundation board's leadership, we are continually reaching our goals to achieve this mission. Thank you for the past 50 years and many more years to come.

Harper College alumna Ashley Rosenthal (Promise class of 2022) started her Harper education in the fall of 2020 during the pandemic, but that didn't stop her from getting involved. As an honors student, Promise Scholarship recipient, and general manager of the Harper College student-run radio station, Ashley has embraced her time as a Harper Hawk. In addition to being recognized as a 4.0 scholar at graduation, Ashley received a national award for her work at the radio station. Igniting Paths to Success Scholarship:

providing access to higher education

When her little sister was born, Carmen had an epiphany. She had always been interested in science and the human body, but participating in her younger sister's birth gave her a new perspective on the importance of neonatal nurses.

"I realized that nurses can really change your experience," Carmen said. "Who you are as a caregiver can change a family's whole experience."

In high school at the time, Carmen knew she wanted to study to become a nurse in college. But nothing was going to be easy about that. As an undocumented immigrant (who has lived in the U.S. since she was two), Carmen isn't eligible for financial aid. As a child of a single mother (with a toddler on her hands), she was unsure if she had the money to be a full-time student.

After enrolling in a couple of classes for Harper College's fall 2021 semester, the Wheeling resident applied for the Igniting Paths to Success Scholarship. Made possible by a donation from philanthropist MacKenzie Scott and funds from the Harper College Educational Foundation, the scholarship is designed to help underserved members of Harper's community by paying for tuition, books and fees. She said she was desperate for any amount of financial assistance.

Her desperation turned to joy when she received the Igniting Paths scholarship. She celebrated with her mom and immediately enrolled in two more classes – realizing her plan to go to college full-time.

"I want to put my all into these classes and, without having to work all the time, I can," said Carmen, 18. "It's weird not to feel stressed about paying for college."

Harper launched Igniting Paths to Success in the summer of 2021 with the goal of helping 1,000 students from the community access and prioritize higher education for two academic years. Each semester, scholarship recipients must be enrolled in at least six credit hours, meet with their academic advisor, follow a required academic plan and maintain a 2.0 GPA to continue their eligibility for the scholarship.

Starting with the fall 2021 semester, a variety of Harper students have been making the most of the opportunity. The Ignite Scholars range from traditional-age students who are the first in their families to enroll in college to older students embarking on new careers to better support their families and fulfill their career goals.

As we emerge from the pandemic from the past two years, we are entering a revitalization phase of helping people start and complete their education which will ultimately lead to establishing better careers and brighter futures. C.H. Johnson Memorial Scholarship pays it forward

Upon graduating from Austin High school in Chicago, my dad attended Wright Junior College in Chicago in the mid-1930s to become an automotive mechanic. In 1946, he was able to secure a new car dealership franchise for Hudson Motor cars. I often worked there on weekends and summers at an early age running errands, shoveling snow, sweeping up and such. In the late 1950s - early 1960s, my dad employed three men of color, two of which worked their way up to the full mechanics level.

On numerous occasions, customers would bring their cars in for service, and upon learning that a mechanic of color would be working on their vehicles, they requested a white mechanic. My dad would be called, and he explained that all the mechanics were qualified, and he would guarantee their work. When a customer insisted on a white mechanic, my dad would politely suggest they take their business elsewhere, which many did.

I witnessed this several times personally and heard about numerous other occasions. Being young myself and considering the era, I did not fully comprehend the magnitude of his actions and stance until many years later. Unfortunately, my dad died unexpectantly at age 48 when I was 18 years old.

Considering my dad's training from Wright Junior College and his early stance on diversity, I want to honor and acknowledge his memory. His community college education paved the way for a successful career for him, as well as a means for supporting our

family. I had an early "learning" of diversity, equity and inclusion from my dad during a very controversial time in our country's history.

I attended Harper for one course in the summer of 1968 when I was working towards my undergraduate degree in accounting at Northern Illinois University. The Harper campus was under construction at that time; the class was held at Elk Grove High School.

My goal is for these scholarship recipients to get their education and, as part of their life's path, to "pay it forward" to others. They can encourage friends, family, and others to further their education in the path best suits them. Perhaps the recipients might be in a position to assist others financially sometime down the road. Such encouragement in whatever form will compound the benefits of this scholarship.

My favorite tradition at Harper is graduation day, whether it be the Honors Convocation, the formal full school graduation ceremony, or the high school equivalency graduation. The families attending exude their pride in the family member being recognized. The family youngsters seem to be awed by the whole experience, which hopefully motivates them to take a similar path, expanding on their own potential. The hope and future vision on the graduates' faces is a mini reward for me to witness their success.

Distinguished Alumni returns to Harper for presentation and reconnects with Harper faculty

Christopher J. Schneider and Stacey
Hannem are well-respected sociologists.
They're both doctors in their field
and serve as professors at Canadian
universities. They have written, and edited
major works focused on crucial social
issues. They recently co-authored a new
book, Defining Sexual Misconduct: Power,
Media, and #MeToo.

And they both admit that when they took their first steps as college students, neither knew what sociology was.

The collaborators (who are also a couple) laugh about this now, given their success in the field as well as their endless fascination with subjects within. Chris learned about sociology after he enrolled at Harper College in 1997. While taking Introduction to Sociology, helmed by now-retired professor Helmut Publ, Chris' curiosity about sociology became insatiable. Because of the access he had to his professors, Chris could easily gain advice, book recommendations and more.

"As a straight white man, I knew what racism and sexism were, but I didn't experience it," said Chris, who grew up in Hanover Park and Schaumburg. "Sociology opened up my eyes to learning about the experiences of other people, as best I could."

Introduction to Sociology wasn't just a class for him; it was a "mind-blowing experience" that led him to an associate degree at Harper, a Bachelor of Arts degree at Northeastern Illinois University, a masters at Northern Illinois University and a doctorate at Arizona State University, teaching and writing on his chosen subject – media – along the way.

With similar interests at separate institutions (Chris is a professor at Brandon University; Stacey chairs the Criminology department at Wilfrid Laurier University), the couple began to build a life together. Then they decided to write a book together.

Chris describes Defining Sexual

Misconduct as something that could not have been written by just one of them.

"This book is absolutely a product of both of us, 50/50," Chris said. "She brought training, research and background in sexual violence. I've always been interested in how media informs culture."

The couple, who were together when #MeToo caught fire, began having very specific conversations about sexual harassment and misconduct in relation to their genders and lived experiences – not to mention their academic expertise.

"We thought, "We should bring all of these things together," said Chris, a 2021 Harper College Distinguished Alumni Award recipient.

In April, the co-authors visited Harper
College and spoke about Defining Sexual
Misconduct to students, faculty, staff,
alumni and the community. A reception,
book signing, and meet-and-greet
followed, including a reunion with Chris
and his first sociology professor, Dr. Publ.



Motorola Solutions Foundation

Distinguished Faculty Award

Dr. Richard Johnson has been selected as the 2022 recipient of the Motorola Solutions Distinguished Faculty Award, the highest faculty honor at Harper. This recognition comes with a \$3,775 award, funded through the Motorola Solutions Endowed Award for Teaching Excellence.

Rich is a champion for globalized learning in his classroom, undergraduate writing, literature, the Humanities and social justice. He has worked diligently to institutionalize International Education at Harper College. His overarching mission is to foster global education, develop international awareness through collaborative programs, enhance the knowledge of global dynamics, cultural diversity, and world issues for students, faculty, staff, and the surrounding community and celebrate the world's cultures and traditions.

One of Rich's notable highlights is his work in creating the Global Region of Focus, which offers faculty the professional development experience of a graduate seminar in a region that concludes in a two-week field seminar in representative countries and a curriculum infusion project. This effort has impacted more than 7000 Harper College students. Students who enrolled in Global Region of Focus classes had increased persistence and completion rates. Under his leadership, the Office of International Education has been honored nationally with the NAFSA Paul Simon Spotlight Award for Campus Internationalization (2018) and the IIE Andrew Heiskell Award for Internationalizing the Community College (2020).

Rich's commitment to students is further evidenced in his work creating the Global Scholar of Distinction. This distinction recognizes students who have demonstrated the capacity to consider intercultural and international perspectives across academic disciplines and the willingness to actively explore issues relating to global equity, justice and peace. Rich has been a leader in implementing and assessing Harper's revised World Cultures and Diversity graduation requirement. In addition, Rich



has successfully acquired competitive grants to support global education initiatives and has been intentional about the inclusion of underrepresented student groups in these opportunities. His dedication is further demonstrated in his efforts with the development of the Social Justice Leadership Certificate Program. The most significant illustration of Rich's excellence is recognized through his contributions in the classroom. He has taught developmental and credit-level English and Humanities to students during his tenure at Harper. He has played an active role with learning communities, the Honors Program, and numerous study abroad programs with students, staff and other faculty.

At his core, he is a teacher. Dr. Richard Johnson has made tremendous contributions to the experience of Harper students, faculty and staff, and he is a well-deserving recipient of Harper's 2022 Distinguished Faculty Award.

Motorola Solutions Foundation

Award for Excellence

Since 1981, Motorola Solutions has sponsored its Award for Excellence, the highest honor a Harper College student can earn.

The Award honors a student who has demonstrated outstanding achievement in STEM, information technology or public safety academics, extracurricular activities, and community service while attending Harper College, focusing on supporting students from underrepresented populations, including females, people of color, people with disabilities, veterans and others. This year's Motorola Solutions Foundation Award for Excellence recipients are Jonathan Lasso and Yosi Mendoza. Both students received scholarships for \$5,000 each.

Jonathan Lasso is a first-generation college student. His family immigrated to the United States, and he is a Latinx student. Jonathan is part of Harper College's Engineering Pathways Program, and his goal is to work in the automotive engineering sector. He plans on attending the University of Illinois Urbana Champaign in the Fall of 2022. Jonathan has a 4.0 GPA. He is

also part of the One Million Degrees program and a member of the Harper Club, Harper Society of Engineers. Outside of school, Jonathon works 15 hours a week as a cashier.

Yosi Mendoza's family immigrated to the United States from El Salvador to escape the terrorism during the Salvadorian Civil War of 1977. She is a first-generation college student. Yosi is an adult student with an 11-year-old daughter. She is studying law enforcement and has a 4.0 GPA. Yosi works full-time as a supervisor in the restaurant industry while she is pursuing her degree.

"This scholarship has a significant meaning to my life. It supports me to continue pursuing my passion. It provides hope for students that want to fight for a better future. This scholarship transforms lives and helps individuals use their talents to shape a better future for the next generations to come," said Yosi Mendoza.

Chicago White Metal Casting, Inc. Scholarship supporting workforce development

Our relationship with Harper College began approximately 10 years ago when we brought on interns from Harper's Manufacturing program. After his internship, one of those interns joined Chicago White Metal and is currently our Traffic and Materials Manager. Because of the success we saw early on with the internship program, we knew that Harper's Manufacturing program was solid and was preparing individuals well for the future. Therefore, we wanted to find a way to continue our support for years to come. We created the Chicago White Metal Casting Scholarship a short time later.

The funding comes from the Chicago White Metal Charitable Foundation, which Walter Treiber Sr. created on November 13, 1961. Mr. Treiber founded Chicago White Metal in 1937. During World War I, he immigrated to the United States from Germany, arriving here with minimal education. Mr. Treiber always felt that education was very important, and he did not want others to miss out on the formal education that he never received. As a result, he created the Charitable Foundation with the primary focus of supporting advanced education. This same focus guides our Charitable Foundation today, and the scholarships for Harper College students support his ideals.

For Chicago White Metal, Harper College's Manufacturing program is where students can learn trades and provide direction into industries that need the next generation's attention and support. We need to make more products in America again and bring jobs back to America. Harper's program supports what our country so desperately needs.

Harper College Apprenticeship Programs are industry-driven, highquality career pathways to serve the workforce's needs. They are designed to help employers recruit, develop and retain talent in a grow-your-own staff model. Graduates complete the program with either an Associate of Applied Science degree or certificates from Harper College, their Registered Apprentice Department of Labor Certificate of completion verifying proficiency in their occupation, third party credentials and hands-on industry experience.

Harper will assist with recruiting candidates to the program, and apprenticeship students receive concierge service from Harper, including a dedicated student success coach to see them through the program. Harper's Apprenticeship Program has a proven track record of producing strong results for employers and workers.

Apprenticeship partners include Zurich North America, who celebrated Harper alumni who work at Zurich in 2019 with a Harper@Work: Alumni Recognition Program at their North American headquarters in Schaumburg.

Harper@Work: Corporate Virtual Mentoring

The Harper College Educational Foundation launch a new corporate engagement initiative – Corporate Virtual Mentoring.

We know the benefits that mentorship has on students – opportunities to engage with mentors who can provide guidance, support, career modeling and networking can be life-changing experiences. Many of the Harper College Educational Foundation's corporate partners have asked how they and their employees (some of whom are Harper College alumni) can help Harper College students beyond the financial support of scholarships.

In response to this request, the Foundation launched a pilot program with three of our valued corporate partners – Clearwater Capital Partners, Motorola Solutions and Vistex – to pair their employees with Harper students for limited-term, virtual mentoring.

Mentors attended a one-hour virtual orientation to learn more about Harper College and mentoring in general. After completing a short application, mentors were matched with Harper College students. From May to July, mentors and mentees were asked to meet virtually two to four times over Zoom, Teams, Webex, email or text

Foundation guests experience the Harper classroom

On April 28, a group of community members, alumni and Harper volunteers experienced three Harper College programs through the lens of a student with an interactive campus tour.

During the event, guests visited four academic areas of the College - the Simulation Hospital and the Surgical Technology, Chemistry and Law Enforcement and Justice Administration programs. Guest met faculty and experienced learning first-hand with hands-on activities, similar to students' experiences in the classroom. Students from the Chemistry Club and the Forensics IV class were on hand to meet with the guests, guide them through activities and share how they have been impacted by scholarship support.
